Summary	"The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Department of Agriculture National Agricultural Statistics Service, Oregon Field Office has completed a survey of the state's natural resources industries employers. The purpose of the survey was to estimate, for each major sector: the total number of year-round and seasonal jobs; the number of green year-round and green seasonal jobs; information about green-related job activities; what skills employers have difficulty finding when hiring; and other information related to workforce training and development needs within Oregon's agricultural industries. The survey results represent the collected employment data for 'covered' and 'non-covered' agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting employers. Non-covered employers are those that are not subject to Oregon's unemployment insurance laws, and tend to be concentrated in the state's natural resources industries."
Key Findings	In 2009 there were an estimated 122,730 jobs throughout Oregon's natural resources industries.

	Farmworkers make up three out of every five jobs.
