


Industry Employment, which includes self-employment, unpaid family workers, private household workers, farm, and nonfarm employment in Alpine, Inyo and Mono Counties, is expected to reach 19,270 by 2022, an increase of 21.3 percent over the 10-year projection period. All 13 nonfarm industry sectors are projected to grow between 2012 and 2022.




Total nonfarm employment is projected to grow by 3,180 jobs by 2022. Sixty-five percent of all projected nonfarm job growth is concentrated in three industry sectors.

- Nearly a third of the nonfarm growth is expected to be concentrated in leisure and hospitality with projected job gains of 1,040 through 2022.
- Government anticipates job gains of 650, and is the largest industry sector in the area with more than a third of total nonfarm employment in 2012.
- Retail trade is expected to have the third largest increase during the projections period with job gains of 390.

Occupational Employment forecasts 3,500 new jobs from industry growth and approximately 4,080 job openings from replacement needs for a combined total of more than 7,580 job openings.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate about 4,690 total job openings, which is nearly 62 percent of all job openings. Due to the expected growth in the leisure and hospitality industry sector, nearly a quarter of these jobs are in the food preparation and serving related occupations. These occupations pay approximately \$9 to \$16 per hour and require a high school education or less.

The 39 fastest growing occupations anticipate an annual growth rate of 2.2 percent or higher. Eight of every ten occupations on the list require a high school diploma or less and range in hourly wage of \$9 to \$30. Higher skilled occupations on the list pay \$33 to \$57 per hour and range from registered nurses that require an associate's degree to instructional coordinators that require a master's degree.
