


2014-2024 Projection Highlights Fresno Metropolitan Statistical Area (Fresno County)



Industry Employment, which includes self-employment, private household workers, farm, and nonfarm employment in Fresno County, is expected to reach 432,200 by 2024, an increase of 12.3 percent over the 10-year projection period. Twelve of the 13 nonfarm industry sectors are projected to grow between 2014 and 2024.




Total nonfarm employment is projected to gain 43,200 jobs by 2024. Seventy-one percent of nonfarm job growth is concentrated in four industry sectors.

- Educational services (private), healthcare, and social assistance is expected to add the most jobs, gaining 13,700 jobs, an increase of 24.1 percent.
- Leisure and hospitality anticipates job gains of 7,000.
- Professional and business services is projected to gain 5,500 jobs.
- Construction is projected to gain 4,500 jobs, and is the fastest growing sector with an increase of 33.3 percent.

Occupational Employment forecasts 50,700 new jobs from industry growth and 89,100 job openings from replacement needs for a combined total of 139,800 job openings.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate 81,000 total job openings over the projection period, which is 58 percent of all job openings. Farmworkers and laborers, crop, nursery, and greenhouse comprise 12 percent of this list. Among the top ten occupations, higher skilled occupations such as registered nurses and general and operations managers require a bachelor's degree. These occupations earn median hourly wages of \$42.90 and \$43.44, respectively.

The 50 fastest growing occupations anticipate a growth rate of 21.7 percent or higher. Thirty-eight percent of the fastest growing occupations are concentrated in construction, and food preparation and service. These occupations require a high school education or less and earn median wages that range from \$9.46 to \$28.43 per hour.
