


## 2014-2024 Projection Highlights Napa Metropolitan Statistical Area (Napa County)



**Industry Employment**, which includes self-employment, private household workers, farm, and nonfarm employment in Napa County, is expected to reach 96,100 by 2024, an increase of 20.3 percent over the 10-year projection period. Eleven of the 12 nonfarm industry sectors are projected to grow between 2014 and 2024.




Total nonfarm employment is projected to grow by 14,600 jobs by 2024. More than two-thirds of all projected nonfarm job growth is concentrated in four industry sectors.

- Leisure and hospitality is projected to add 3,100 jobs, the largest job growth of any industry sector. The majority of the growth comes from the food service and drinking places industry.
- Manufacturing, the largest industry sector, expects a 2,400 job gain.
- Educational services (private), health care, and social assistance is projected to add 2,300 jobs.
- Mining, logging, and construction will add 2,000 jobs. This industry sector is also expected to be the fastest growing, at 54.1 percent over the projection period.

**Occupational Employment** forecasts 16,300 new jobs from industry growth and 19,300 job openings from replacement needs for a combined total of more than 35,600 job openings over the projection period.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate 22,800 total openings, 64 percent of all openings. The top three occupations on this list are waiters and waitresses; retail salespersons; and farmworkers and laborers, crop, nursery, and greenhouse. Their median hourly wages range from \$11.99 to \$13.38, requiring no formal educational credential. Higher-skilled occupations, which require a bachelor's degree or higher, include general and operations managers and registered nurses. These occupations earn median hourly wages of \$48.13 and \$50.08, respectively.

The 48 fastest growing occupations expect a growth rate of at least 20.7 percent. Occupations requiring no formal educational credential include hosts and hostesses, restaurant, lounge, and coffee shop; and combined food preparation and serving workers, including fast food. Their median hourly wages are \$10.60 and \$10.72, respectively. The highest-paying occupation is education administrators, elementary and secondary school, with a median annual wage of \$116,304.
