




Industry Employment, which includes self-employment, private household workers, farm, and nonfarm employment in Del Norte, Humboldt, Lake, and Mendocino Counties, is expected to reach 124,600 by 2024, an increase of 13.1 percent over the 10-year projection period. Eleven of the 13 nonfarm industry sectors are projected to grow between 2014 and 2024.




Total nonfarm employment is projected to gain 12,380 jobs by 2024. Seventy-five percent of all projected nonfarm job growth is concentrated in four industry sectors.

- Educational services (private), health care, and social assistance is projected to gain the most jobs, adding 3,580 jobs.
- Leisure and hospitality is projected to add 2,260 jobs, an increase of 20.0 percent.
- Government is projected to grow by 1,990 jobs, with local government contributing the majority of growth with 1,660 jobs.
- Retail trade is projected to gain 1,500 jobs.

Occupational Employment forecasts 15,000 new jobs from industry growth and 26,100 job openings from replacement needs for a combined total of 41,100 job openings.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate more than 25,600 total job openings, which is 62 percent of all job openings. The top three occupations with the most job openings are cashiers; personal care aides; and retail salespersons which account for 21 percent of the job openings on the list. These occupations require no formal educational credential. Registered nurses and general and operations manager, requiring a bachelor's degree or higher, are the only occupations among the top ten that require an entry education level higher than a high school diploma.

The 50 fastest growing occupations anticipate a projected growth of 17.6 percent or higher. Occupations range from hosts and hostesses, restaurant, lounge, and coffee shop, earning a median wage of \$9.64 per hour to police and sheriff's patrol officers earning a median wage of \$42.91 per hour.
