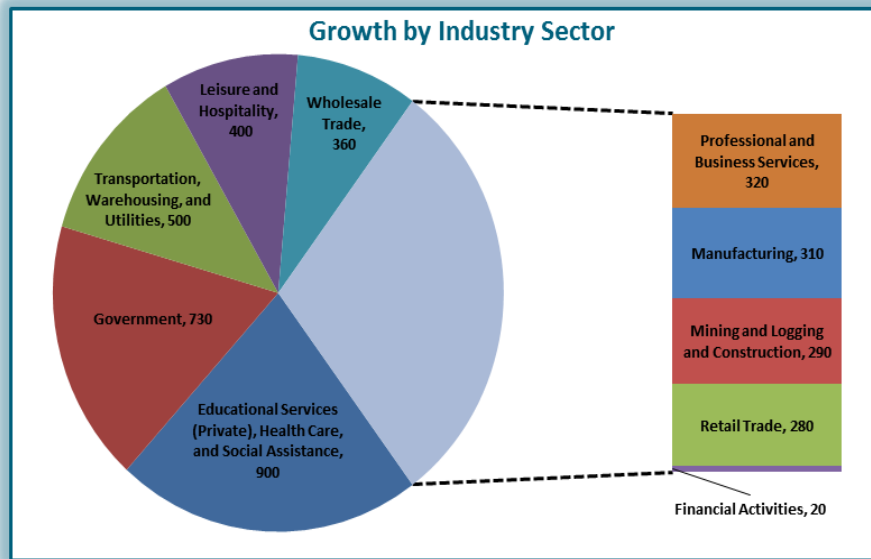


Industry Employment, which includes self-employment, private household workers, farm, and nonfarm employment in Colusa, Glenn, and Tehama Counties, is expected to reach 43,010 by 2024, an increase of 14.4 percent over the 10-year projection period. Ten of the 12 nonfarm industry sectors are projected to grow between 2014 and 2024.



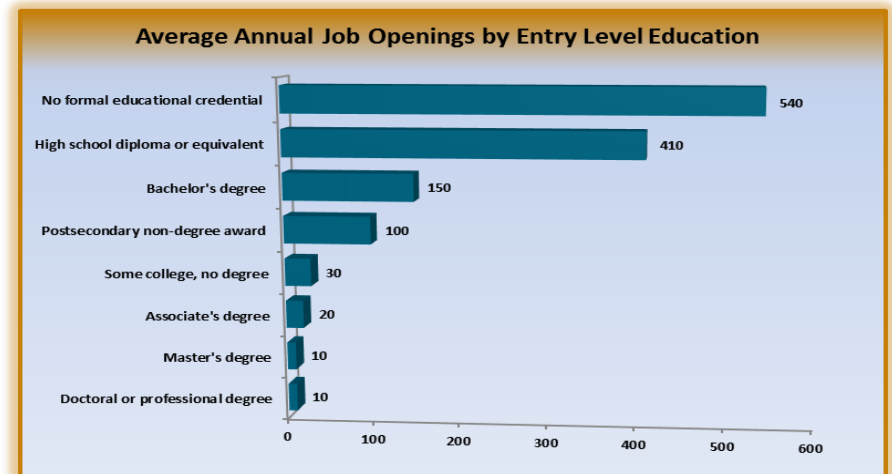
Total nonfarm employment is projected to gain 4,050 jobs by 2024. Sixty-two percent of all projected nonfarm job growth is concentrated in four industries.

- Educational services (private), health care, and social assistance is projected to gain the most jobs, adding 900 jobs.
- Government is projected to add 730 jobs, led by a gain of 610 jobs in local government.
- Transportation, warehousing, and utilities, is projected to add 500 jobs, an increase of 23.8 percent.
- Leisure and hospitality is projected to gain 400 jobs.

Occupational Employment forecasts 5,860 new jobs from industry growth and 8,830 job openings from replacement needs for a combined total of 14,690 job openings.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate more than 9,700 total job openings, which is 66 percent of all job openings. Farmworkers and laborers, crop, nursery, and greenhouse; and farmers, ranchers, and other agricultural managers account for 22 percent of the job openings on the list. These two occupations require a high school diploma or equivalent or less. Higher-skilled occupations, requiring a bachelor's degree or higher, include elementary school teachers, except special education; middle school teachers, except special and career/technical education; and registered nurses.

The fastest growing occupations anticipate a growth rate of 14.7 percent or higher. Sixty-eight percent of the fastest growing occupations require a high school diploma or less. Occupations range from combined food preparation and serving workers, including fast food earning median wages of \$9.71 per hour to medical and health services managers earning \$50.11 per hour.
