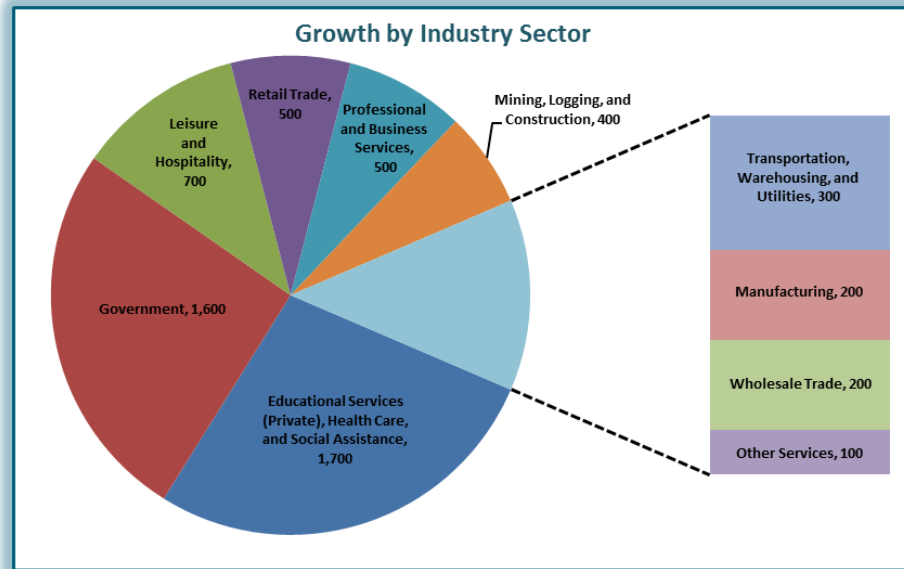


Industry Employment, which includes self-employment, private household workers, farm, and nonfarm employment in Sutter and Yuba Counties, is expected to reach 55,400 by 2024, an increase of 15.9 percent over the 10-year projection period. Ten of the 12 nonfarm industry sectors are projected to grow between 2014 and 2024.



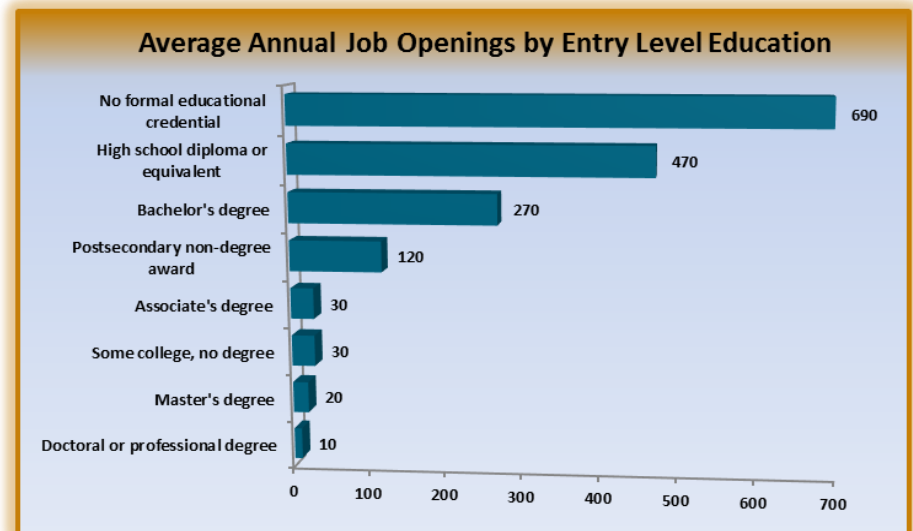
Total nonfarm employment is projected to gain 6,100 jobs by 2024. Sixty-six percent of all projected nonfarm job growth is concentrated in three industry sectors.

- Educational services (private), health care, and social assistance is projected to gain the most jobs, adding 1,700 jobs and leading all sectors by growing 23.9 percent during the projection period.
- Government, the area's largest sector, accounts for one-quarter of all nonfarm employment and is projected to gain 1,600 jobs.
- Leisure and hospitality is projected to add 700 jobs.

Occupational Employment forecasts nearly 8,100 new jobs from industry growth and more than 11,200 job openings from replacement needs for a combined total of approximately 19,300 job openings.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate 1,165 total job openings annually, which is 60 percent of all job openings. The top three occupations with the most job openings are farmworkers and laborers, crop, nursery, and greenhouse; cashiers; and personal care aides. These occupations earn median hourly wages ranging from \$9.50 to \$10.36 and require no formal educational credential. Higher-skilled occupations, requiring a bachelor's degree or higher, include registered nurses, general and operations managers, and civil engineers.

The 34 fastest growing occupations anticipate a growth rate of 16.7 percent or higher during the projection period. Occupations range from farmworkers and laborers, crop, nursery, and greenhouse which require no formal educational credential and earn a median annual wage of \$19,769 to medical and health services managers which require a bachelor's degree and earn a median annual wage of \$110,020.
