


Industry Employment, which includes self-employment, unpaid family workers, private household workers, farm, and nonfarm employment in Sutter and Yuba Counties, is expected to reach 54,300 by 2022, an increase of 14.6 percent over the projections period. Eleven of 12 nonfarm industry sectors are projected to grow between 2012 and 2022.




Total nonfarm employment is projected to grow by 6,500 jobs by 2022. Sixty-eight percent of all projected nonfarm job growth is concentrated in four industry sectors.

- Educational services, health care, and social assistance is projected to add 1,600 jobs, leading all sectors in job gains and accounting for 25 percent of nonfarm job growth.
- Government is expected to add 1,300 jobs while growing 12.6 percent over the projections period.
- Retail trade will grow 14.5 percent over the projections period by adding 800 jobs.
- Professional and business services will add 700 jobs.

Occupational Employment is projected to add nearly 7,300 new jobs from industry growth and more than 11,100 job openings from replacement needs for a combined total of approximately 18,400 job openings by 2022.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate more than 1,120 total job openings annually, or 61 percent of all job openings in Sutter and Yuba Counties. The top three occupations with the most job openings are farmworkers and laborers, crop, nursery, and greenhouse; combined food preparation and serving workers, including fast food; and cashiers. These occupations have median wages ranging from \$9.03 to \$11.28 per hour. Higher-skilled occupations, requiring a bachelor's degree or higher, include civil engineers, general and operations managers, and elementary and secondary school teachers.

The 50 fastest growing occupations anticipate an annual growth rate of 1.7 percent or higher. Twenty-two percent of the fastest growing occupations are in either construction or healthcare practitioner related fields. Occupations range from waiters and waitresses that require less than a high school education and earn median wages of \$9.03 per hour to pharmacists that require a doctoral or professional degree and pay median wages of \$66.77 per hour.
