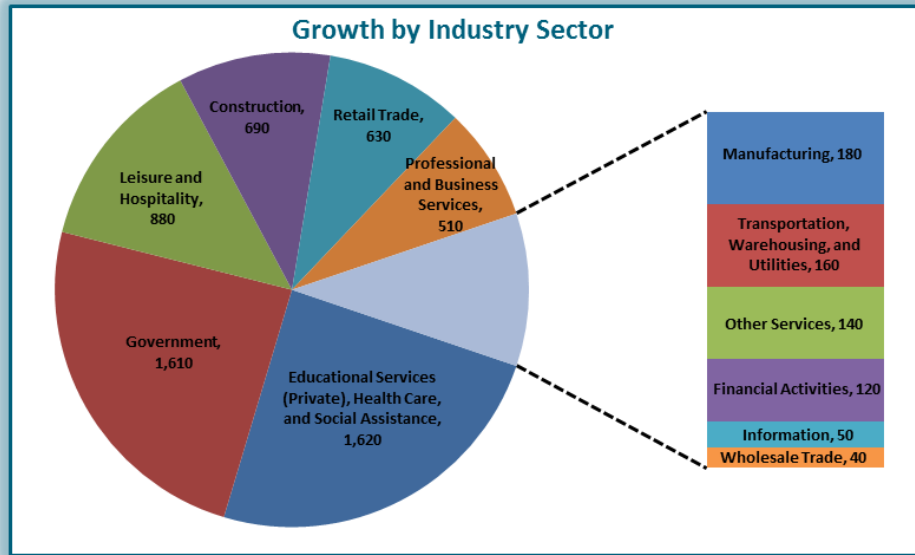


Industry Employment, which includes self-employment, private household workers, farm, and nonfarm employment in Amador, Calaveras, Mariposa, and Tuolumne Counties, is expected to reach 51,830 by 2024, an increase of 16.1 percent over the 10-year projection period. Twelve of the 13 nonfarm industry sectors are projected to grow between 2014 and 2024.



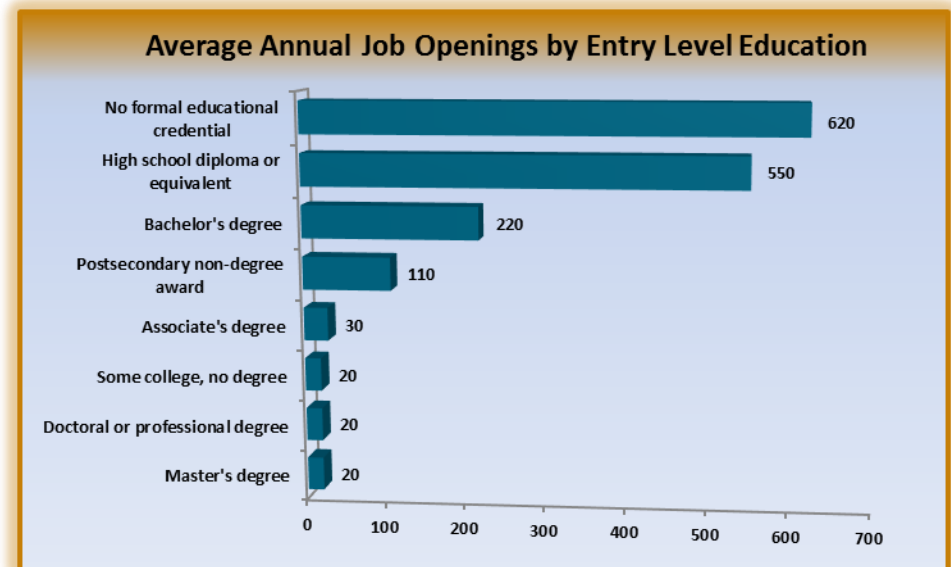
Total nonfarm employment is projected to grow by nearly 6,660 jobs by 2024. Sixty-two percent of all projected nonfarm job growth is concentrated in three industry sectors.

- Educational services (private), health care, and social assistance is projected to add the most jobs, adding 1,620 jobs with a growth rate of 27.4 percent over the projection period.
- Government anticipates job gains of 1,610, led by a growth of 1,210 jobs in local government.
- Leisure and hospitality is projected to add 880 jobs with a growth rate of 13.5% over the projection period.

Occupational Employment forecasts 7,380 new jobs from industry growth and 10,990 job openings from replacement needs for a combined total of 18,370 job openings.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate 10,810 total job openings, which is about 59 percent of all job openings. The top three occupations with the most job openings are cashiers; combined food preparation and serving workers, including fast food; and waiters and waitresses. These occupations have median wages ranging from \$9.85 to \$11.31 per hour and require no formal educational credential. Higher-skilled occupations, requiring a bachelor's degree or higher, include registered nurses and accountants and auditors.

The 50 fastest growing occupations anticipate a growth rate of 20.0 percent or higher. Occupations range from counter attendants, cafeteria, food concession, and coffee shop that require no formal educational credential earning \$9.66 per hour to medical and health service managers that require a bachelor's degree earning median wages of \$60.04 per hour.
